TEXAS SECOND IN COLLEGE NATIONAL

The University of Texas proved that last year's performance in taking the team trophy at the National Intercollegiate Individual Championship was no one-off performance by placing a strong second in this year's event. The team and individual events are held on alternate years. The National Intercollegiate Team Championship was held at California State College, Los Angeles, December 26-30.

Texas tied with San Jose State College and MIT in match points with 6-1, but San Jose finished first on game points with 22-6, Texas had 20-8 (exactly the same as last year), and MIT was third with 16½-11½. The matches between these three went as follows: San Jose defeated MIT 4-0; MIT downed Texas 2½-1½; and Texas beat San Jose 2½-1½. San Jose has a strong, balanced team composed of five experts, led by Osburn, 2197.

Rolf Stachowitz, a master from Germany, now attends Texas as a Linguistics major. He replaced Stephen Jones at 1st board this year. Stachowitz met one master (Tomchin) and six experts (including Osburn) and scored 5½-1½. He defeated both Tomchin and Osburn, but lost to Wagner of MIT. Henry Davis, current National Intercollegiate Champion, played second board and for the second straight year went undefeated, finishing with a 6-1 score. Jack Hardy played third board, and scored well with 4½-2½. Henry Dove and Jerry Lassen shared fourth board, scoring 3½-2½ and ½-½ respectively.

Dr. Dale McLemore, faculty advisor, rightfully expresses his pride in his

team's consistently fine performance. Our congratulations for representing our state so well in this competition.

In the regional ACU Intercollegiate Chess Tournament this month, Hardy and Dove will represent the University of Texas as their "A" team.

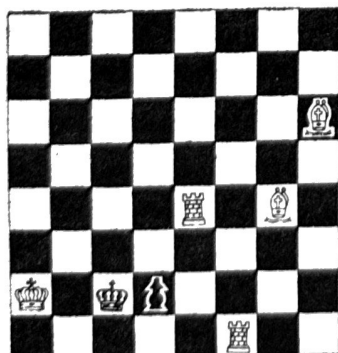

THE BODEN - KIESERITSBY GAMBIT

This line appears only as a note in MCO 9 under Petrov's Defense, but can also be reached from the Vienna Game or Bishop's Opening. Its moves can be found in a manuscript written in 1584 by Polerio. The consensus of authors seems to be that it is unsound. In Fletcher's "Gambits Accepted" he points out that with correct play Black should reach an eventually won end game, but also that the variation is "sufficiently aggressive to succeed in many practical encounters". David G. Thomas of Lubbock has enjoyed numerous victories with this little known gambit and now shares his analysis with all TCA members.

- (a) Not 6...N-K4 7. Q-Q4!
 (b) Better is 9...P-QN4 10. N-Q5 with approximately equal chance.
 (c) 10. N-B4! P-Q4 (if 10...P-QN4 11.N-N6±) 11.PxP NxP 12.NxN QxN 13.QxQ BxQ 14.N-N6 R-Q1 15.NxB RxN and White has the better endgame due to his two bishops and queen-side majority. The text should lose a pawn.
 (d) Instead 10...NxN! 11.PxN Q-R4ch wins a pawn.
 (e) 11. ...Q-B1 12.N-B7ch loses only the exchange, but gives black no counterplay.
 (f) Threatening 14. ...BxN followed by 15. ...RxN or 14. 111B-N5ch 15.P-B3 NxQBP

RADER HOUSTON AMATEUR CHAMP

A tournament restricted to Class B or lower rated players was decided in the fifth and final round at the Houston Chess Club, when Robert Rader met Don Clayton. Clayton had a perfect score and only needed a draw to win first since Rader had been held to a draw in the third round. Rader won the finish alone in first place with 4½ game points. Clayton and Steve Moffit were tied at 4-1, but Moffit was second on tie-breaking points. Twenty players competed in the event directed by Baytown's Eric Bone.
