BONE TOPS SAN JACINTO OPEN

Again displaying the excellent style of chess which won him the state title in the past, Eric Bone of Baytown captured the San Jacinto Open title with four wins and a final round draw with William Bills. George H. Smith, Houston Cronicle chess columnist, matched Bone's $4\frac{1}{2}$ game score but placed second on Median points after his first two victims withdrew from the tournament. They each received a trophy and divided \$130 in cash.

William Bills, David Lees, and Robert Brieger each scored four points. This was the Region V T. C. A. qualifying tournament and Bone, Smith, Bills, and Brieger won the four entries into next November's Candidates tourney. Lees is from Region II. The four point scorers divided \$30 in prizes. The top three players went undefeated but Lees lost to Bone in their very important 4th game and defeated Brieger in the third round.

Bill Garrett celebrated his new Houston address by capturing the Class A trophy with $3\frac{1}{2}$ points and 6th place. Jeff Baker followed his excellent showing at the Alamo Open with another good performance to capture the Class B trophy. Daryl Hanks found his stride and won Class C.

The six experts and ten Class A entries made this a very strong event, with complaints to the Director each round that he was giving too tough opponents! The tournament ended with a little more confusion than planned when Robert Rader and tourney director Bob Dudley played a six-hour marathon. At that point they agreed to hand it to the adjudication committee so the prizes could be awarded.

(a) The Closed System, a favorite of Smyslov, which usually leads to a position game, but not the way Bone plays it!

(b) White does not waste any time starting a king side attack.

(c) Preparing a defence along the second rank. 11. ---, R-B2; loses to 12. PxNP, NxP (12. ---, PxNP??; 13. Q-R8 mate); 13. PxP, PxP; 14. B-Q5, wins.

(d) Not 13. ---, PxP??; 14. B-Q5ch, K-R1; 15. QxN wins.

(e) With a series of strong moves White has built up a fine attack. The next move which brings another piece into the game and threatens 18. N(3)-N5, is preferable to the immediate win of a pawn with 17. N-N5, R-N2; 18. NxRP.

(f) Black's best chance. If instead 17. ---, Q-K2; 18. N(3)-N5, R-N2; 19. NxRP, RxN; 20. QxNch, K-R1(20. ---, R-N2; 21. N-B6ch, K-B1; 22. R-R8ch, and mate next move); 21. N-B6!!; RxRch; 22. K-Q2, and Black can-

Seven-round Swiss sponsored this year by the Houston Chess Club at the Hotel America in downtown Houston.

(g) If 19. ---, QxN(B4); 20. NxR, KxN; 21. QxPch, K-B3; 22. R-R6, wins. 20. N-N3

(h) If instead 20. P-Q4, P-K4; is okay for Black.

(i) This loses. 23. ---, B-B4; or 23. ---, P-K5; should have been tried.

(j) Hastening the end, but there was no real defense.

The analysis by David Thomas in the February issue has prompted comment by Robert Brieger. He agrees that the first column is good, but the second column contains a flaw. It should read after 1. P-K4, P-K4; 2. N-KB3, N-KB3; 3. B-B4, NxP; 4. N-QB3, NxN; 5. QPxN, N-QB3; 6. N-KN5, Q-K2; and now 7. BxP ch! (instead of 7. NxP? as given) ... K-Q1; 8. N-K6ch winning Black's queen.

Column four is very illogical, especially note (e) which gives poor moves for White. Columns 3 and 5 give White the advantage based on weak moves for Black.

The true refutation of the Boden Kieseritsky is given in Keres' book on the openings, and Brieger submits a skittles game in which he played white versus Billy Patteson to illustrate the line.

NOTES BY DAVID LEES

(a) A popular way of meeting the Tarrasch Variation nowadays. 3.---, P-QB4; 3.---, N-KB3; and 3.---, PxP are the alternatives.

(b) A novel variation which seems inferior to the usual 4.---, N-B3.

(c) White shows excellent understanding of the position. He realizes Black is contemplating an advance of his KP and his bishop will then have a fine diagonal.

(d) Playing right into White's hands!

(e) This wins!! The threat of 11. Q-R5, cannot be properly met. White has completely refuted Black's opening

(f) This is the best Black has. Other moves also lose (A) 11.---, QN-K2; 12. N-B6ch!!; PxN; 13. QxP, PxN; 14. BxP, and the threat of 15. B-B6, and mate on N7 can be met only by the great loss of material. (B) 11.---, PxN; 12. NxP, R-K1; 13. NxP, Q-B3; 14. NxBch, wins.

(g) Or 12.---, NxN; 13. Q-N6, B-K2 (13.---, N-K2?; 14. N-B6ch and mate next move); 14. BxP, B-B3; 15. N-N5, R-K1; 16. QxNch, K-R1; 17. BxPch, BxB; 18. Q-R5ch, B-R3; 19. QxB mate.

(h) Or. 13.---, PxP; 14. QxRP, B-K2; 15. R-K3, and Black is defenceless.

(i) Or (A) 15.---, K-K1; 16. N-B6ch, K-B2 (16.---, K-K2?; 17. B-N5, wins Black's queen); 17. B-N5, B-B4; 18. N-K4, and we have the same position as after White's 16th move in the actual game! (B) 15.---, K-K3; 16. P-Q5ch, KxP; 17. NxBch, KxN; 18. QR-Q1ch, wins.

(j) Not 20.---, K-N1?; 21. B-B6, Q-R2; 22. R-K8cy, and mate next move or 20.---, N-N3?; 21. Q-R7ch, winning Black's queen.

(k) Exchange and pawn down Black could resign.

- A coffee house move!
- White decides on a Maroczy Bind set up instead of the regular 6. N-B3.
- An illogical move. Better was 6.---, P-Q3; or 6.---, N-QB3.
- If instead 7.---, N-B3; 8. P-K5, N-KN1; 9. N-K4, with a far superior game for White.
- Threatening to win a piece with 13. KBxN.
- The bind has worked splendidly. Black is terribly cramped.
- Black is trying to free his game by exchanging pieces, but the pressure remains.
- Of course not 20.---, QxP??; 21. BxPch, wins Black's queen, however 20.---, B-N2; was possible as 21. RxQP?, RxR; 22. BxPch, R-B2; 23. R-Q7, QxR!; 24. BxQ, RxB; 25. P-B6?, R-QB2! (not 25.---, R-QB1?; 26. RxP, wins); is unsound for White.
- 'if 22.---, P-N3; as. PxP, NPxP; 24. R-N1, and White can invade by way of the KN file while most of Black's pieces are cut off for the defense.
- Black's position has become hopeless. Facing the murderous threats of 24. PxP, and 24. P-KB6, Black blunders.
- Winning a rook due to the threat of mate on KN8.
- Desperation!
- Attack and defence in one move! Black will now have to give up his queen to stave off mate.

- Regular is 5.N-QB3
- Of course not 6.P-K5?,Q-R4ch; winning White's KP.
- In order to play 11.B-K3,without being harassed by N-N5.
- Black prudently refrains from winning the QRP with 12,---, BxN. Although probably playable it would be quite risky to say the least!
- Black has attained a fine game against White's unusual opening set up. He now intends to post his knight on Q5 but as it cannot be maintained there a build up of pressure on White's position with 13.--, B-QR3;14.---,QR-N1;etc seems preferable.
- If 19.---,R-N6;20.P-K5.
- Correct is 21.---,RPxP; and White has little chance for a successful king side attack, while Black should win on the queen side.
- Very alert!
- Despite all its bad looks 22.---,PxP should have been tried.
- The QNP is poison.23.---,RxP?;24.RxR,BxR;25.QxB!,RxQ;26.R-B8 mate
- No better was 24.---,R-B2;25.B-Q5ch,K-R1;26.RxB!,PxR;27.Q-K7, B-B3;28.B-N7 mate.
- Desperation! If instead 26.---,PxR;27.Q-K7,followed by mate.

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
